WOUND CARE BIOPSY

Do not wet the wound for 24 hours.

After 24 hours you may wet the wound. If the wound gets too saturated then pat it dry with a clean tissue. Leave the dressing on for up to 4 days or until you return for removal of stitches.

Do the following if you wish to change the dressing:

- 1) Clean wound with one teaspoon of salt added to one cup of water using a piece of gauze or clean cotton tip. Then pat dry with with a clean tissue.
- 3) Apply a small amount of Vaseline to the wound/suture site.
- 4) Place a piece of Hypafix dressing (supplied) along the suture/wound.
- 5) It is not necessary to do this daily, as it is best if the wound is not disturbed too much.
- 6) Signs of infection include pain, swelling, redness or discharge present in the area. See below
- The area may drain clear fluid, and you may notice some white material in the base of the wound and a thin rim of redness around the wound as it heals. The wound may also develop a crust or scab. These developments are normal.
- If the wound becomes very tender or swollen with increasing redness, or if pus drains from the wound, this may be a sign of infection. If this occurs, please call us on (02) 99669667 during business hours.
- If wound continues to bleed, please apply firm pressure with a clean cloth or gauze and elevate the area if possible for 20-30minutes. If the bleeding does not stop then please contact us on the numbers above.
